The WHO budget covers the costs of employment and activities of 54 people in 17 field locations and 8 people in the WHO office in Yangon. The Regional Surveillance officers are government employees selected by the MOHS to work as WHO surveillance officers for the duration of one year only. Each year a new batch is selected by MOHS, they are not actively recruited by WHO. They receive a monthly stipend from WHO, which is above their salary as government employees.
