Health workers on the front lines vaccinated hard-to-reach children, drivers transported vaccines to warehouses, and surveillance officers worked to quickly and effectively track down the virus.

## Real-time polio surveillance in Africa demonstrated for KOICA

The idea is simple: surveillance officers use an app on their mobile phones to document active case searching as it happens, by tagging the location of every healthcare facility they visit and check. A delegation from the Korea International Cooperation Agency (KOICA) received a first-hand demonstration of this system on their visit to WHO's Regional Office for Africa in Brazzaville. Disease surveillance is fundamental to effective outbreak response and builds on Korea's support for polio eradication efforts. [\[More\]](#)

## FUNDING UPDATES

**Monaco** has contributed €50 000 for polio eradication activities in Niger as a part of its long-standing commitment to global effort for polio eradication since 2005, which is further reiterated by Ambassador Carole Lanteri's past co-chairmanship of the Polio Partners Group.

At the January 2019 meeting of the **Rotary Foundation Board of Trustees**, more than US\$27 million was approved in funding for the World Health Organization's (WHO) work on polio surveillance in the African Region and operational support in Afghanistan, the Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC), Iraq, Kenya, Pakistan, South Sudan, Syrian Arab Republic, Yemen, and for research activities.

The **National Philanthropic Trust** granted more than US\$22 million in funding to WHO to support outbreak activities, replenishing the monovalent oral polio vaccine stockpile, the deployment of consultants to high-risk countries, and support for supplemental immunization activities in DRC, Chad, Cameroon, and Niger.

## Polio chairs visit Afghanistan and Pakistan:

The incoming and outgoing Polio Oversight Board Chairs released a joint statement underscoring their commitment in this critical year. WHO Director-General Dr Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus and Chris Elias, President of Global Development at the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, reflected on their visits to Afghanistan and Pakistan, where they witnessed the continuing progress and efforts to end polio.
