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Wild Poliovirus in Numbers

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In the past, misconceptions and mistrust have kept some communities from accepting essential health services like polio vaccination. To improve immunization and trust in such communities in Nigeria, UNICEF has worked with 228 Muslim and Christian clerics to mobilize caregivers against social norms that prevent families from vaccinating their children. This powerful collaboration has not only supported polio eradication efforts, but has also delivered additional health benefits to mothers and babies across Nigeria. [Read mo
