GPEI leaders and staff observed International Women’s Day (8 March) by recognizing the leading role of female health workers in the charge against polio, and – just weeks later – marked five years since the WHO’s South-East-Asia region was certified polio-free (27 March). Amid these celebrations, the programme continued to make new strides against the virus, convening donors, experts and health officials for key meetings in Geneva and Brazzaville.

Data as of 29 March 2019, compared to the same point in 2018.

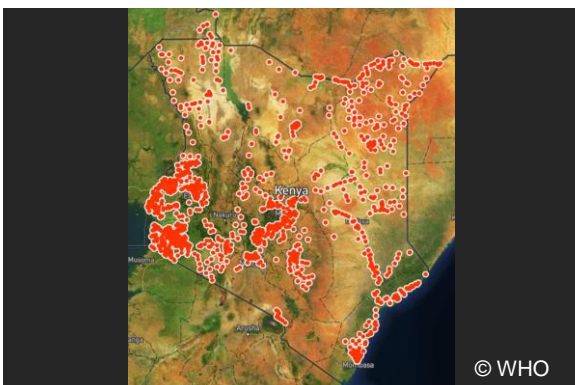

FUNDING UPDATES

The UN Foundation provided US\$ 1.64 million to support oral polio vaccine (OPV) procurement in 2019.

The **Crown Prince of Abu Dhabi** has released US\$ 6.2 million through the UAE Pakistan Assistance Programme to support campaigns in high-risk districts. These funds are part of the US\$ 30 million pledged at the Rotary Convention in 2017 in Atlanta, USA.

New Zealand has pledged 2 million New Zealand dollars towards the outbreak response in Papua New Guinea as well as funds to revitalize the routine immunization system. These polio funds are in addition to the 5 million New Zealand dollars pledged at the 2017 Rotary Convention. Australia also provided additional 3 million Australian dollars, bringing its total allocation to 9 million Australian dollars. The [2018 Outbreak Response Report](#) highlights the heroic efforts of polio workers, with the support of the Government of Australia.
