

# November 2023 POLIO NEWS



Dear polio eradication supporter,

This week, global leaders have gathered in Dubai for COP28, the paramount annual climate convening. While this event has historically focused exclusively on climate, 3 December will mark the first-ever COP Health Day—a major milestone in the evolving global conversation around the dynamic between climate and health. This Health Day will also include the Reaching the Last Mile Forum, an opportunity for leaders to discuss the urgent need to build health systems that are resilient to climate threats, from monsoons to earthquakes to heatwaves. In Pakistan, a priority country for the polio program, the disastrous impacts of the climate crisis on health efforts like polio eradication are already clear. The polio program is <a href="hard at work">hard at work</a> to help respond to climate emergencies, in Pakistan and around the world, and will continue to adapt on the path to a sustainable, climate-resilient, polio-free world.

This month, the GPEI published a draft of its <u>response</u> to the Independent Monitoring Board's <u>midterm review</u> released earlier this year. On 28 November, GPEI partner representatives spoke to media about where the program stands today and how the GPEI is working to overcome remaining hurdles and deliver a polio-free world.

#### A flight to end polio



Rotarians have historically been strong advocates in the fight to end polio, and John Ockenfels and Peter Teahen are no different. Over 12 weeks, the two traveled 26 000 miles around the world on a "Flight to End Polio," raising more than US\$1 million for polio eradication efforts. They are not

alone in believing in a polio-free world—Rotary also highlighted the perspectives of several polio experts, including from WHO, UNICEF and the US CDC, in a recent episode of "Rotary Voices." Listen here.


#### **DONOR UPDATES**
