Dear polio eradication supporter,

On 24 October, partners and champions from around the world came together to celebrate World Polio Day and call for the urgent end to polio everywhere. Among many highlights, UNICEF Nigeria launched a new music video from West African artists, No More Zero Dose, and football legends on Paris Saint-Germain shared a message in support of Team End Polio. U.S. President Joe Biden expressed the country's continued commitment to eradication in an official White House Statement for World Polio Day. Health Ministers of the <u>G7</u> and <u>G20</u> also reaffirmed their dedication to ending polio this month.

This critical show of support comes a week after the GPEI's Polio Oversight Board approved a revised budget for the extended 2022-2029 strategic period. To make polio history, the world must rally together now – US\$ 2.4 billion more and renewed political commitments will be paramount to end polio in the face of today's challenges.

### Ensuring access to nOPV2 around the world



nOPV2, which has been in development since 2011, is a next-generation polio vaccine that is being used to more sustainably stop type 2 variant poliovirus outbreaks, the most prevalent form of the virus today. So far, over

1.2 billion doses of nOPV2 have been delivered to children in countries around the world. Now, Biological E in India is joining Bio Farma to manufacture nOPV2, critically increasing supply of this important vaccine to protect more children from polio. ## Polio vaccine campaign resumed in northern Gaza after pause due to escalating conflict



Two weeks ago, the Polio
Technical Committee for Gaza,
along with key health
organizations, postponed the
third phase of a vital polio
vaccination campaign in northern
Gaza due to extreme violence,
restricted humanitarian access,
and safety concerns for both
families and health workers. This
phase was restarted over the

weekend but substantially reduced, limiting the number of children who will receive their crucial second dose of nOPV2. Interruptions in the campaign and continued violence put efforts to control the polio outbreak at risk, jeopardizing children's health in Gaza and beyond. <u>UNICEF</u> and <u>WHO</u> urge all involved parties to support humanitarian pauses, enabling safe vaccination access and safeguarding civilians. 
