Dear polio eradication supporter,

Last month, polio <u>program leaders</u>, donors, and advocates came together on the sidelines of the 80<sup>th</sup> Session of the United Nations General Assembly (UNGA) for an <u>important event</u> to reaffirm commitment to end polio everywhere. Co-hosted by the GPEI, UNICEF, WHO, and KSRelief, the event emphasized the importance of sustained funding to finish the job, highlighting the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia's US\$ 500 million pledge to the GPEI, announced in April 2024. Also, during UNGA week, the <u>Polio Oversight Board convened</u> to discuss progress made and the remaining challenges to end polio. The group committed to building on investments in vaccination, surveillance, and integration to protect the health of children everywhere. Additionally, the GPEI welcomed the <u>24<sup>th</sup> report</u> from the Independent Monitoring Board. This independent assessment of the program provides critical recommendations to help accelerate progress toward a polio-free world.

#### Continued Investment in a Polio-Free Future



Despite historic progress towards eradicating polio, recent setbacks threaten to reverse decades of gains. Funding cuts, alongside slipping vaccination rates, weak infrastructure, or misinformation in at-risk communities, allow the virus to persist and threaten its resurgence in previously polio-free countries. Experts from WHO warn that without renewed global commitment, the virus could quickly make a comeback. Learn more about the risks and what's needed to finish the fight against polio here.

### Côte d'Ivoire Boosts Polio Surveillance with New Laboratory

In a major step to protect children from polio, Côte d'Ivoire launched a modernized laboratory at the Institut Pasteur to accelerate virus detection and response efforts. Equipped with cutting-edge tools, the facility enables rapid analysis of environmental and Acute Flaccid Paralysis (AFP) samples, eliminating the need to send them abroad. This upgraded lab enhances regional capacity to detect the virus early, putting Côte d'Ivoire in the frontline of the fight against polio in West Africa.
