This month, leaders from across the WHO Western Pacific Region gathered in Tokyo to celebrate 25 years since the region was certified polio-free, reaffirming their commitment to constant vigilance, strong surveillance, and strengthened immunization efforts in every community. This anniversary comes as Indonesia officially announces the closure of its type 2 poliovirus outbreak, following an extensive response, thanks to dedicated health workers and communities, that delivered nearly 60 million additional doses of polio vaccines to children nationwide. Indonesia's outbreak closure and a recent outbreak in Papua New Guinea serve as a critical reminder that polio anywhere is a threat to children everywhere, even in regions long polio-free. Dr Hamid Jafari's Enduring Legacy on Polio Eradication



When Dr Hamid Jafari began his career in global health, polio was paralyzing 350 000 children every year across 125 countries. Now, as he retires as Director of Polio Eradication and Vaccine-Preventable Diseases for

the World Health Organization's Eastern Mediterranean Region, the virus remains endemic in just two countries. Dr Jafari has been at the forefront of historic progress to end polio. From helping India achieve polio-free status to leading efforts in the last two endemic countries, Pakistan and Afghanistan, Dr Jafari's impact spans decades and continents. New Digital Payment Systems Support Polio Workers in Kenya



For years, polio workers in Kenya faced long delays in receiving compensation for their work in vaccination campaigns, undermining morale and disrupting polio outbreak response. To solve this problem, Kenya introduced a new digital payment system to ensure health workers are paid faster and more reliably. So far, over 12 000
