Dear polio eradication supporter,

During this year's <u>World Immunization Week</u> (WIW), Polio Oversight Board (POB) Chair and WHO Director General Dr Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus <u>used his quarterly letter</u> to highlight the critical importance of essential immunization amid the COVID-19 pandemic. The POB also emphasized the increased need for commitments to ensure children will have access to vaccines once this crisis subsides. The polio programme is actively preparing to ramp up vaccination activities once it's safe to do so, and in the meantime is lending its tools, workforce and surveillance network to support the COVID-19 response in countries around the world.

#### Call 1166 for COVID-19 advice

As COVID-19 began to spread, the polio programme helpline center in Pakistan responded by expanding capacity to listen to people's concerns, convey accurate information on the pandemic and provide medical advice from onsite
