Pakistan's Integrated Vaccination Campaign

A WHO-supported measles–rubella vaccination drive in Pakistan integrated polio drops into campaign activities, protecting 34 million children from measles–rubella nationwide and over 19 million children from polio across 88 high-risk districts. By integrating response efforts, health workers are strengthening collaboration between routine immunization and polio programs and reaching more children to ensure every child is protected from preventable diseases.
